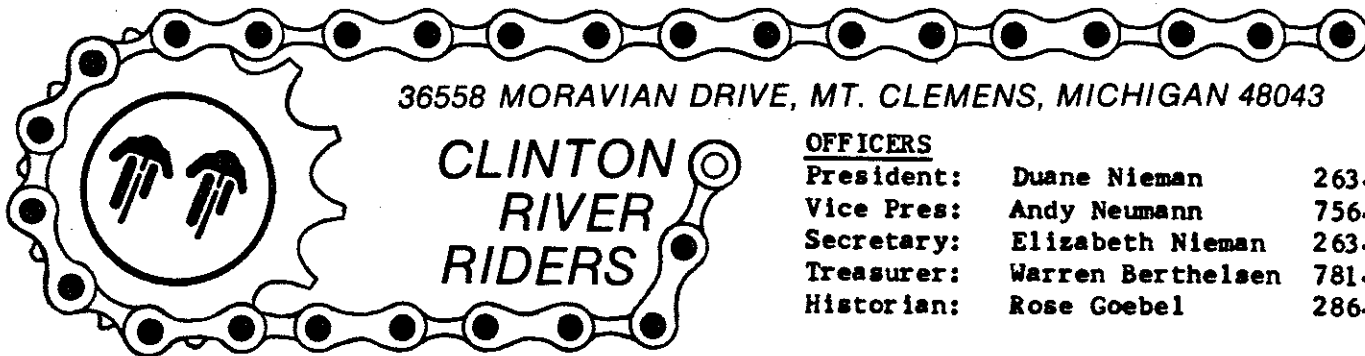

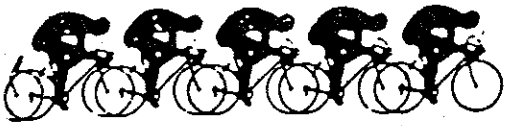

CLUB RIDE AND CROSS COUNTRY SKI SCHEDULE

January 17 - Sunday - Stoney Creek. Bring cross country skis or mountain bikes depending on the weather and meet at 9:00 a.m.. Boat launch for bikes or the West Branch picnic area for skis.

January 24 - Sunday - Addison Oaks. Meet at 9:00 a.m. at Addison Oaks Park, located at 32 Mile and Rochester Rd. Ski or bike depending on the weather.

January 31 - Sunday - 2nd Annual ULLR/FEST Ski Event by the ULLR Ski Club will be held at Addison Oaks, located at 32 Mile and Rochester Rd. There will be a Rendezvous Tour and a Rollickin Relay Race. Registration for all events begins at 9:30 a.m., races start at 1:00 p.m., several divisions for all groups. Can you find yourself?

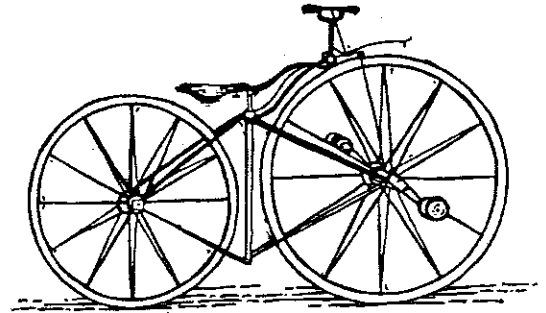
1. Number 1's believe that "bicycles are for kids", the perfect bike is one of them good old Schwinn newspaper bikes with the big comfortable seat". Them skinny seats hurt and are probable unhealthy". A typical ride is "around the block once".
2. Considers a great bike to be "an imported 3-speed English racer". (Probable imported from Southern Ohio) He rides regularly, once or twice a week, and up to 3 or 5 miles at a time.
3. This hotshot has moved up to a light weight 10-speed from K-Mart maybe even a Huffy. His bike weighs only 39 pounds and he rides up to 10 miles at a time, once he even did 25 at Belle Isle. He dreams about owning a Schwinn Varsity.
4. This "serious" cyclist bought his bike at Pavlat's, probably a Ross, and thoroughly enjoys riding. Twenty-five mile rides on the weekend are not unusual. "Looking for a good bike club, anybody heard of one?"
5. Fujis and Treks common here, weight is important and 5's are willing to pay a little more to get a little less. Cycling is often a family activity and 40 to 50 mile rides are considered enjoyable. The family is a good excuse to ride slow.
6. French and Italian equipment is fairly common among 6's. Rides of 50 and up are the norm here. Sixes like to ride fast sometimes, but can enjoy a more leisurely pace. Although 5's and 6's are "into cycling" they usually have a wide range of interests and are involved in several other sports or activities besides cycling.
7. Hard riding is more common here, 75-100 mile jaunts are not uncommon. May ride a bike that he "put together myself". Many 7's, along with most 4's, 5's, and 6's enjoy cycling as much for the scenery through which they ride as for the physical effort of the ride.
8. Eights are really into hard riding. They usually ride very light, very good bikes. They seem, to not care about where they ride, just how far. They ride virtually every day, and usually many miles every time they ride. Speed is king! Families are better left at home.
9. Biking has become an obsession! "Long, hard and fast" are trademarks of this eager group. Cycling seems to be the overriding theme in the lives of these riders. They wear bike clothes everywhere! Own several bikes.
10. The true "bikeaholic"! Owns at least 19 good bikes, some of which are tandems or stump-jumpers. Can not carry on an intelligent conversation about anything except cycling. If you happen to make a remark about the nice weather he'll complain that the wind is blowing the wrong way, "always a head wind". Last saw his family about March 13. Plans on riding 250 miles this Saturday, as a warmup for Sundays ride!

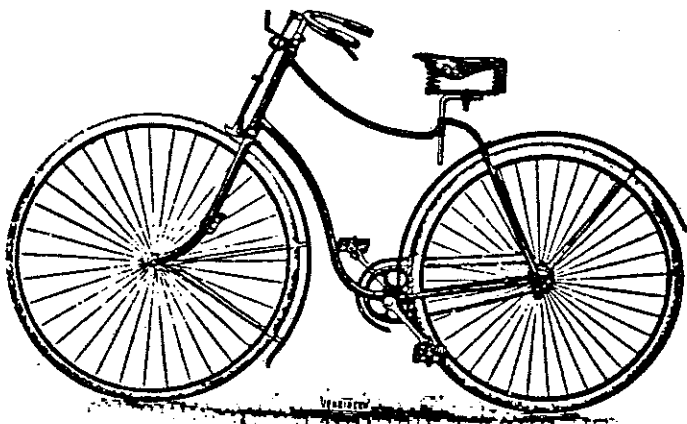
